Finally a big thank you to the lovely Ella Holmes, who for many years has curated La Mama for Kids, and best wishes in her teaching career.



THE HAPPY PRINCE

JANUARY 18 - 29

Little Ones Theatre, purveyors of high camp, take on Oscar Wilde's darkly romantic fairytale.

An adults-only parable of a selfless swallow and a golden statue reveals the betrayal inherent in perceptions of gender, beauty, sex, and class.

"As he is no longer beautiful, he is no longer useful."

Memorialised in living death as a golden statue, a happy prince convinces a swallow to deliver jewels to the poor until, eventually, each of their hearts is broken. Little Ones Theatre transposes this moral and social allegory of Victorian oppression into the world of contemporary homosexual iconography.



THE AGE OF BONES

FEBRUARY 22 - MARCH 5

The Age of Bones (Jaman Belulang) is an Australian-Indonesian co-production about an Indonesian boy, Ikan, who goes fishing one day and fails to return.

Assuming the worst, his parents hire a legendary seafarer to look for his corpse. He finds nothing. The Age of Bones traces what happened to Ikan - from the day he left to his eventual imprisonment in Australia and his fight to return home. Darwin writer Sandra Thibodeaux was inspired by the real-life stories of around 60 Indonesian boys who were jailed in Australia for working on refugee boats

The Age of Bones is mostly set under the ocean in an underwater court, a fantastical piece realized through shadow puppets, video and music.

THE EVOCATION OF BUTOH

MARCH 9 - 12

Evocation of Butoh is a mini festival with the aim of activating artistic and cultural exchange between international artists and local arts communities in Melbourne through the performance art of Butoh. This genre of dance/theatre was started in the late 50's in Japan in the aftermath of WWII. Butoh, originally called the 'Dance of Darkness', finds expression through dance and movement for the visible and invisible states of living. This is a unique opportunity for audiences in Melbourne to experience sublime works by local and international practitioners: a diaspora of artists who left their countries of origin to extend their practice in contemporary society. Intensive workshops, a public forum and an artists' talk will also be presented to stimulate discourse around what Butoh is now in Australia.







The play is based on the true story about Sandy, a horse that hauled bricks in Tallangatta before becoming a warhorse in Egypt during WW1 - the only horse, out of 136,000 that left Australia, to finally be returned home at the end of the war. (See page 35 for full details.)

The play takes place in an asylum-seeking processing centre and reveals the way in which two young people arrived there. It explores their hopes and dreams and shows how their lives have been compromised.

The Yellow Wave (subtitled 'a Romance of the Asiatic Invasion of Australia') is an adaptation of a 19th century novel by Kenneth Mackay telling the story of the invasion of Australia by a Russian-led Mongol force. Using humour the production explores the impact of immigration, engagement of international workers, gender and racial stereotyping, equality and notions of what is 'other' or 'alien'.

As part of our commitment to improving La Mama's accessibility, we have published our 2015 - 2018 Disability Action Plan to welcome all audiences.


